








# from Adam Samuels '79 Class President 2020-current

Vicki, the wife of our recently departed classmate Dave Philhower, has been a long-time supporter of all things 1979. Please join me in welcoming her as an adopted classmate of our class.

**Recap of '79 Conversations on Race:** In light of recent events, a group of diverse '79s got together and, in the spirit of the '79 way of being the "first," crafted a series of "Conversations" on Race and Blackness at Dartmouth. Starting with 'Meeting the Moment," where classmates shared their personal "stories" of being a person of color at Dartmouth and in America, we moved to #2 in the Series, where Women of Color enlightened us as to their particular experience as Black Women at Dartmouth, where they felt "invisible" and "like there were 2 different Dartmouths." #3 in the series was "Voices of Youth," where the BUTA students and other young folks of color further educated us with powerful spoken word performances, allowing us to see and experience Dartmouth through their eyes. Finally, in #4 in the series, entitled "Getting" Stuff Done - the Dartmouth Way," we worked together to provide multiple action steps to take to make our world and Dartmouth better including a class-wide project for all '79s to get involved in, and an ongoing interaction with classmates on these issues.

Gail Granowitz writes: "This conversation series brought together classmates that have not been involved with Dartmouth for a long time, as well as many classmates of color. Each call had over 70 participants, and the Committee received very positive feedback about both the moral and practical imperatives of these conversations."

Margo Squire writes: "It is fitting that our class jumped on these burning issues, just as Gail organized a campuswide discussion of race for the Moratorium our senior year, following destruction of a Black organization's ice sculpture. A number of classmates have expressed frustration that the environment has not improved enough for students of color since our time at Dartmouth. We owe it to them, to all of us, and to future classes to work together to make Dartmouth a nurturing environment for all and to support broader change in our country."

# The 50 Relay August 7-8, 2020 Homines ambulantes in deserto

The germ of The 50 Relay idea was hatched when a group of us arrived in Hanover in summer 2019 to support Bill Conway in his effort to do The 50. The 50 is the hike supported by the DOC each year where a few fit Dartmouth students try to hike continuously for 54 miles

on the Appalachian Trail from Moosilauke Ravine Lodge to Hanover. We didn't quite pull that off, but it was a great team effort and afterwards, T Weymouth suggested that maybe we should do something similar for Reunion. Well, obviously we didn't quite pull off Reunion, but we did get the band back together plus some new recruits and had great fun this past August. Read on. Hope you wish you had been there, and hope you are inspired to sign up for the next 50 Relay adventure whenever we do have Reunion.

So, for The 50 Relay we divided the 54 mile trip into 15 Legs, some longer, some shorter, some harder, and some easier. Each person would hike as many Legs as they wished. The Class Flag would be passed from one team to another so that the flag would traverse the entire 54 miles.

I won't rehash the entire trip but will make a few observations. • Tom and Mary Tomai's house on Rip Road in Hanover served as base camp, and an incredible base camp it was. Fantastic hospitality, especially considering the pandemic. • The hardest night sections were handled by our three Night Hikers: **Tom Tomai**, (to next page... >)













Cube and Smarts Mt. in the dark, basically hiking all night, just missing a major deluge during the early morning hours. Most night hikers had a single headlamp; Sam had an array of lights on his chest that was awesome to behold. • Julie Sudikoff Weisman (who a month later would hike the 272 mile Vermont Long trail with her daughter and daughter's friend) always kept a quick pace and always pulled her group along so that they finished their Legs ahead of schedule. • The Class Flag ended up in Chip Fauver's trusty backpack more often than with any other hiker. • We had a couple of father/son teams. Steve Hufford (who crafted the schedule of estimated start/finish times for each Leg) and his son Alex hiked most of the first day, plus the final stretch on the second day. Hunt Melville '78 (who was joined by his son Alex on Day 2), Dave Wilson (in charge of beverages), T. Weymouth, and Steve Richardson (who drove over from Maine) handled the "middle

of the day" Legs on both days, and coincidentally ran into Marshall Fazzone's daughter, Marsha Fazzone, upon completion of Leg 5. Another coincidence was running

**Somerville** and his family on the trail on Day 1.

Otho Kerr and I hiked Leg 1 up to the top of Moosilauke and back, and then ferried cars around much of Day 1 so that hikers would have their vehicles whenever they finished for the day. Not as simple as it might seem. Next time we'll use Uber. We also took over from the Night Hik-

ers early in the morning after they finished on Day 2.

Peter Greulich filled the role of Command Central in Chicago, monitoring the GPS signals and texts from hikers, providing invaluable projections on when Legs would likely be finished. This was key since there is no cell phone service in the valleys for much of the 54 miles. - Finally, The 50 Relay t-shirts carrying the team's motto "Homines ambulantes in deserto" that you see in some of the photos were provided by Bill, who had surgery the week before the hike and was not able to participate this year.

In summary, 13 '79's and one '78 banded together and hiked hard together to deliver the Class Flag from Moosilauke Ravine Lodge to Hanover in 31 hrs. A real team effort. I can tell that, much like the Stanley Cup, the Class Flag enjoyed the adventure and is looking for more action. If we do pull off a Reunion, we might try a different format where we have different teams starting each Leg at the same time. We'll be able to more easily handle the likely legions of new participants that way. 9>

# Hiking the Long Trail by Julie Weisman '79

"Let roaring trains, straining automobiles, and soaring airships ... accomplish extraordinary feats of speed, but let me wander through the mountains and feast on the beauties which abound on every stride!" That was lames Gordon Hindes in the summer of 1931. He and John Eames, a fellow Dartmouth frat member, were among the first people to hike the newly

completed Long Trail.

My daughter, Leah Weisman, D'10, and I have been talking about thru-hiking Vermont's Long Trail for a year or so but things (like jobs, grad school) kept getting in the way. Thanks to Covid Leah became unemployed and we had the time. The Long Trail is the oldest long distance hiking trail in the country. It runs North-South from Canada to Massachusetts along the spine of the Green Mountains.

Historically, the Greens were inhabited by the Western Abenaki or "People

of the Dawn" who had a special relationship with the mountains. The Long Trail is billed as "a footpath in the wilderness" although it is extremely rugged and not what I would define as a footpath.

Leah and I and our friend, Claire, started our hike on **September 14** in North Adams, MA. We ended at the Canada/Vermont border on **October 8**. Twenty- four days of walking, one day off.

We carried tents and slept out most nights but did enjoy an indoor night a few times. We avoided most of the shelters due

to covid and critters. We saw one bear, one porcupine, one beaver but no moose. We heard screech owls and fisher cats and one night a veritable coyote party. We met a lot of interesting folks on the trail. We were blown away by all the badass women (that made me proud). I am also proud to be a hiking Nana.

When we reached the border

I found I was very emotional. On so many levels it was a powerful experience: doing it with Leah, completing what had been a dream, challenging myself physically and mentally.

And of course my husband, Doug met us at the border with Long Trail IPAs!

Shout out to the '79 50 Relay Team for their part in my training. We had a great 2 days walking from Moosilauke to Hanover.

Shout out to **Chip Fauver** for taking care of us in Manchester, VT - our first resupply stop. Chip and Fran fed us, let us do laundry and drove us to and from the trail. Chip also hiked with us for a morning.

Another Dartmouth assist was Carol Hillman Van Dyke, '78 who took care of us in Stowe when we were wet and cold after two days of downpour. %












