




Leadership in Service to Dartmouth

The class' commitment to helping those in need is perhaps best exemplified through our volunteer and financial contributions to Dartmouth Partners in

Community Service (DPCS), our class project of some 20 years now.

I was encouraged to get to interact with a younger Dartmouth student who is committed to making the world a better place through her career choice."

"Mr. Rumer also works with a nonprofit; however, his work centers on working with an organization that rescues and supports women who were formerly trafficked in India. It was interesting to discuss the similarities and differences between working on a local versus a global stage.

I think the most helpful thing about our conversation was learning about how he navigates the oftentimes fluid structure of nonprofits. Class Treasurer's Update!

How your Class Dues help Class & College by Ellen Gomprecht Oppenheim '79, Class Treasurer



Dear '79's,

s your class treasurer, it is my honor to manage our $m{\Gamma}$ class funds. It is also my obligation to drive you crazy about paying your class dues (!).

That said, I thought I would take a moment to describe our philosophy for the class dues we collect, and our plans for the savings we have accrued over the years.

We believe that class dues should be used primarily to support class unity and maintain and strengthen the bond that we began as undergraduates. With that goal in mind, dues are used to sponsor class wide activities, often in the form of mini reunions. We also publish and mail several beautiful newsletters each year; our newsletter-

editor-extraordinaire Mark Winkler is expanding the newsletter publication rate to five annually. Dues are also used to help defray reunion expenses when necessary (reunion budget projections are made far in advance of registration, so a balanced budget is only achieved when we prognosticate very accurately!). Finally, we maintain class identity and pride by contributing to the cur-

rent undergraduate experience through our class project, Dartmouth Partners in Community Service (DPCS). We request donations each year in support of this program,

and often donate more than we collect from our dues solicitations.

We also use class dues for the Memorial Book Fund, where we place a book in the library's permanent collection for each deceased classmate. The selection is made to reflect the interests of the classmate being remembered. Last year, when Dartmouth Hall was under renovation, we made a gift towards that project (the Class is listed on the wall of honor inside Dartmouth Hall). We donated one dollar for each woman who matriculated with our class, in accordance with the renovation's goal of honoring female alums. The class has occasionally used funds from our treasury to make similar donations to the College. In our 40 year history we have supported the football team's recruiting efforts, as well as admissions efforts towards diversity.

Our "Pay it Forward" program allows classmates who overpay dues in a particular year to pass it on to classmates who have never paid their dues. Classmates who overpay are offered 3 choices: allocation to future year dues payment, reallocation to the class project, or to pass it on to an unpaid classmate. This has been one explanation for our success in achieving over 50% dues participation in the past few years. FYI—we had the highest number of dues payers of ALL classes, by a wide margin. The class of 1979 ROCKS!!!!

The class has some savings that are conservatively invested in an account at T Rowe Price, which was established by former class treasurer, Charlie Vieth, in 1992. The rest of our funds are moved between Paypal (where online payments are made), Bank of America (where we have a dedicated reunion checking account) and Ledyard Bank (who processes all checks sent via snail mail, then sent monthly to the Alumni office for input into the dues database).

Often, classes dip into their savings to make a splash at their 50th reunion. It's hard to imagine, but this event is only nine years away. Your class officers will thoughtfully ex- coin to pay your g guide this decision at the appropriate time.

That's a short summary of our class treasury. I am always open to your suggestions and your questions—so please contact me any time. I can be emailed at

ellen.opp@gmail.com, and I would love to hear from you! I am also happy to report to you that my successor, Tom **Ewing**, will be taking over in June—so your class treasury will be in good hands well into the future.

Dartmouth College Fund Thank You!

nce again, the Partycipatory™ Class of 1979 built the biggest bonfire of the year! Your Class completed its fund raising efforts for Dartmouth's undergraduates with nearly **579 classmates**, **over 60**%, making a contribution. This is over 160 classmates more than any other 40th reunion class in Dartmouth history, over 200 more than the average of the last five 40th reunion classes including the 80s and 81s. 79s truly stand with the students in this time of need.

Three particularly generous statistics to share: We ended up with 124 classmates that at least doubled their gift amount. The 1769 Society (gifts of \$2,500 or more) welcomed 94 classmate members, including 23 newbies, tying us with the 80s for the most of any reunion class. These contributions resulted in a challenge match of nearly \$300,000 from three generous classmates. Overall we raised \$1.6 million for unrestricted DCF funding this year.

Thanks to so many of you for your help in supporting the students. Your support is helping fund financial aid for a record number of Dartmouth students. It will be used to boost Dartmouth's goal of increased diversity of all kinds. It will also be used to help an even greater percentage of



incoming freshpeople than prior years. They are all enormously grateful that you stand with them. There is truly strength in numbers.

Thanks to the dozens of classmates that generously give their time to help these students. We have a very special team of folks that receive a lot of messaging from me and in turn reach out to y'all. An extra special thanks to folks on our SWAT team this year, including Stan-o Weil, Jim Wasz, Burr Gray, Ben Riley, Gail Granowitz, Sue Cohen, Charlie Vieth, Dave Klinges and Ken Beer. Last minute phone calls are critical to remind folks about the deadline and fun since you get to catch up with folks you do and don't know. You too should try it!

Finally, a big thanks to the Crew that pulls all this together for the students. **Peggy Epstein Tanner, Jim Feuille, David Wolf, Nancy Schwartzman Malmquist** and **George Stone** all have a big hand in reaching out to classmates to support the students (We also had

the greatest number of Bartlett Tower Society newbies ever for a reunion class...Woo Hoo Nancy and George!). **Dave Philhower's** fingerprints were all over this year's results as well; he worked incredibly hard to get many contributors to help out late last year, which enabled us to win the D250 competition. We missed Dave enormously in June, but his lessons on friendship and human connection reached all of us on both sides of this letter. We are forever a better Class and College because of his efforts to connect us.

On Tuesday, 11/11/20, the Dartmouth Club of Washington, D.C. honored **Dr. Gerard Cox**, Assistant Under Secretary for Health for Quality & Patient Safety, Veterans Health Admin., U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs, as the recipient of its 2020 Daniel Webster Award for Distinguished Public Service.

With nearly four decades of distinguished government and military service, including as a combat veteran, Gerard Cox has had substantial impact on the health of thousands of service men and women, veterans, and their families. In the wake of the 2014 scandal that involved accusations of widespread corruption and led to the resignation of the VA Secretary and other senior officials, Dr. Cox overhauled the

Office of the Medical Inspector, helping to restore public trust by impartially investigating VA whistle-blowers' allegations. He later established a new Office of Integrity to foster an ethical culture, enhance oversight, and strengthen accountability.

As Deputy Under Secretary for Health for Organizational Excellence from 2017-2020 and in his current role, he has been responsible for VA's compliance, ethics, oversight, quality, and patient safety programs. Today, he leads the VA on its ambitious journey to reduce medical errors. Dr. Cox's decades of military service include treating casualties of the 1990-91 Gulf War in a field hospital during his first Middle East deployment, serving as second in command of U.S. Naval Hospital Okinawa, Japan (the Navy's largest overseas medical facility) and commanding Naval Hospital Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. https://youtu.be/pCg8BHT7qq4 %
