Which leads us to now: Looking forward to a new academic year (even though we may not be directly affected by it) and looking back at what was accomplished last year.

in a future issue, provide a 'dashboard' to all that happened and what we intend to make available this year – here is a summary of FY20-21:

- We had extraordinary success in engaging classmates we participated as a whole ~859 times in 20 virtual and 2 in-person events;
- Despite the constraints of a pandemic, we were able to bring classmates together to engage with a wide range of topics – some purely fun, and some focused on larger issues in our communities and society – and were able to remain connected and engaged even in virtual environments;
- We fielded two surveys, and analyzed responses from over 200 classmates. We share learnings from our most recent one elsewhere in this issue;
- Our efforts to re-connect with classmates included the compilation of numerous lists grouped by affiliations (Greek life, clubs, sports, LSA/FSA, freshman roommates), which we intend to use to re-connect with those of who haven't been around in a while;
- We emailed over 50 messages to classmates too many, in my view, given all that we receive from the College related to events, solicitations, and reminders;
- We reported the deaths of three classmates **Ed Sabisky**, **Pat Quinn** and **Jack Peterson**;
- We adopted **Tracy Dustin-Eichler**, Director of Dartmouth's Center for Social Impact (the former Tucker Foundation) as a classmate;
- Over half of us paid annual dues to the class, thus allowing us to provide the Dartmouth Alumni Magazine to everyone for free. Thanks if you were one of them!
- Ten classmates mentored undergraduate interns remotely during the pandemic;
- 367 of us contributed financially to Dartmouth Partners for Community Service, and the class donated a total of \$20,000 (the most in our recorded history);
- Two additional classmates advised us that they were including Dartmouth in their will, for a total of 42 4% of us so far;
- **Janie Simms Hamner** kept us entertained with six Dartmouth Alumni Magazine columns;
- **Mark Winkler** produced five newsletters, and created a smaller, more readable digest format that is the envy of our peer classes;
- Our ever-active DCF fundraising team led us to another year of record performance, with 571 classmates contributing \$738,510 in support of students attending the College.

We also have a number of volunteer officers who completed their terms this June – we send them all our gratitude and appreciation for all they have provided over many hours and years:

Can there be anything else, after all of this, you think? Well, yes.

Imagine, if you will, that we have stepped into the future, and are looking back from the end of June, 2022. We had a great year, filled with participation, re-connection and the joy of being together once again. And here's what we see we accomplished:

- At least 790 classmates (and others) have participated in 28 in-person and virtual events and activities;
- 2. We surveyed you twice, and made improvements in activities based on what you told us about how we're addressing what's important to you;
- 3. We emailed you less frequently, and explored ways to streamline how we keep you informed and engaged;
- 4. At least 495 classmates supported our activities through class dues;
- 5. At least 79 classmates registered as mentors to student interns; 79% of dues payers will have contributed to DPCS;
- 6. At least 7.9 additional classmates (!) advised us that they have included Dartmouth in their wills;
- 7. We delivered six Dartmouth Alumni Magazine columns;
- 8. We delivered six class newsletters;
- 9. 579 classmates contributed at least \$790,000 in support of students attending the College;
- 10. A review and update of our constitution was completed, and changes approved by the class.
- 11. At least 5 more classmates have begun volunteering with the Class.

Mount Cardigan Class Hike: Homecoming Friday, Oct. 8

The Class of 50 Relay Team invites you to join us



on a hike up nearby (40 mins away) Mount Cardigan on the Fri morning (Oct 8) of Dartmouth's Homecoming weekend. Cardigan is a more modest and gradual climb (about 1300 ft vertical climb) and offers great views due to a granite mountaintop that had the trees burned off in a forest fire back in 1855. Perhaps the foliage will be at peak. The current plan is to meet in front of the Hopkins Center facing the Green at 9:00 am, head to Cardigan, have a picnic lunch on top, and then return to Hanover by 2:30 pm. If you would rather head to Cardigan first before going to Hanover, meet us at 10:00 am in the State Parking lot at the base of the west side of Cardigan. Remember: west side, not east side. More than enough time to rest and recover for the 6 pm pre-parade pizza and then the evening's speeches and bonfire.

The 3-mile loop we suggest goes up the West Ridge Trail from the State Park parking lot to the top of Cardigan, and returns via the Clark Trail/ South Ridge Trail. Probably takes about 3 hours, including the picnic. Dress in layers, wear sturdy walking shoes (sandles are a bad idea since the top can be slippery), and bring a jacket/rain gear, hat and lightweight gloves. It can be windy at the top and feel much colder than at the bottom. Bring a water bottle and a packed lunch, and use sunscreen.





The College first cleared the Green by felling the pines in a circular area in 1770, with **some of the trees being an extraordinary 270 feet high.** Eleazar Wheelock gave some sermons in the great cathedral created by the clearing among the gigantic trees, which were so tall that little daylight could be seen on the forest floor until the sun was high in the sky each day.

Clearing continued in 1771 though it would be sixty years before all of the stumps had disappeared; **for a time each class had to remove one stump.** ... Dartmouth's Green had not been replanted with trees and still gave the effect of being hewn from the wilderness. ...**stumps of the lofty pines that originally covered it remaining many long years in position**...

[In 1828 the Trustees] voted 'that the executive authority procure it to be plowed, leveled, seeded and handsomely fenced, with walks and trees ... **Finally**, in 1836... the **plan was carried out**"

The challenges of racial justice posed by the past year prompted the formation of the '79 Committee on Race to engage in conversation, increase our consciousness and elevate inclusive voices of our classmates and current Dartmouth students. The coming year, we believe, calls us to continued conversation and learning as we strive for a stronger Dartmouth and society that draws upon the diverse experiences we all bring to our humanity.

Conversations on Race

To this end we ask you to **"stay tuned"**^{*} as we continue our planning to provide more ways for the Class of '79 to participate. Here are some of the ideas we are working on:

Small-Group Discussion Gatherings:

- **Book Study Group(s)**, with use of moderators to explore books dealing with issues and themes of race/racism and its various intersections of class, gender and sexuality. **Fall 2021**
- **Grandma & Grandpa Story Time Workshopping**: a virtual sharing of children's books, resources and ideas about sharing diverse and inclusive voices, histories and culture – **Fall 2021** (late Oct/ early Nov in time for Christmas)
- Current Events Discussion(s): "The US 2020 Census: Unpacking its Meanings", moderated by either a '79 specialist or a Dartmouth professor. – Spring 2022
- Film Discussion Group(s) -- Race & Representation in Visual/Literary Culture, facilitated discussion of film(s), television and fiction. -- TBD

"Mini-Events": simultaneous, in-person (COVID-19 permitting) in multiple cities on a designated weekend exploring local sites focusing on issues of Race and Inclusion, - (Winter & Spring 2022) for example:

• Washington D.C.: this might include a visit to the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, followed by a moderated discussion and dinner.

- **Los Angeles:** this might include a visit to the Japanese American National Museum and its permanent exhibit on the incarceration of Japanese/Japanese Americans during World War II, followed by a discussion on Japanese American – Black Kinship & Reparations, or a visit to Watts Towers followed by a discussion of Black LA
- **Boston**: this might include a walk on the Black Heritage Trail, followed by moderated discussion

ALL CLASS DISCUSSION Gatherings:

- "Convo" (in the first half 2022) dealing with focused topics like "Healthcare Disparities," or "Intersections of Race, Gender and LGBTQ"
- Mini-Event Revelations & Offerings an all Class gathering with brief summary of the Class Mini-Events from around the Country/ Globe – May 2022

*no specific dates have been set and will be announced in coming '79 newsletters and Facebook posts

Since we are still in the planning stages – nothing is in stone – the COR encourages you to provide us with ideas and feedback. However, given our ambitions we cannot accomplish all these goals without HELP from you. We will be looking for classmates to assist in organizing, hosting and facilitating mini-events and small group discussion gatherings. If any can help with any of these ideas – or have one of your own – please reach out.
