





Baker Library Book Donations by Ben Riley

wanted to report on the Baker Library Book Donation program. As you may know, since about 1994, our Class has donated \$60 to Baker to buy a book dedicated to a

deceased classmate. Under this program we have purchased approximately 44 books for classmates. The \$60 donation amount was set by the officers in 1994 and has not changed since that time. In the last few years, we have lost between four and seven classmates each year, so our current annual expenditure for this program is between about \$250 and \$450.

In response to a recent email chain among a few of the class officers, I wanted to learn more about the Baker program and how our gifts fit in. I had a Zoom call with Tim Wolfe, head of Baker Acquisitions. I have been dealing with Tim on this program since 2010, and it was very nice to put a voice with his name. Tim explained the College is going to buy the books we help fund anyway, so our donation helps the acquisition budget. In addition, 41 other classes participate in this program, many at different price

levels. FYI, when a classmate dies, I tell Tim four or five interest areas of the person so he can try to connect a book on their acquisition list with our classmate. (Incredibly cool, and just by "'79 luck," one of our classmates, David "Rusty" Joyce, was honored by the dedication of a book written by Mark Winkler's daughter, Emily Winkler' 08!) Tim adds a very nice bookplate, with the classmate's name and dedication, to the front jacket of each book.

I asked Tim about the statistics of the Baker program and he wrote me as follows: "Baker purchases about 20,000 print volumes a year, spending around \$1.2 million to do so. As for the Alumni Memorial Book Fund program (AMBF), with 42 participating classes, the amount contributed for memorial books ranges a bit year to year. However, the contributions fall in the \$26,000 to \$32,000 range, a very meaningful support to the overall print budget."

All this is to underscore the key fact and importance of our gift program to the College. And it suggests to me that we can afford to continue the current \$60 program at least until we all reach approximately 80 in 2037.

ast June our Class completed a sensational, and consistent, giving year supporting Dartmouth's students. We finished the year with nearly 600 contributors, over 100 more than any other Dartmouth class. We were awarded a Dartmouth Scholar.

We just got an opportunity after Ale (pronounced ah-leh, short for Alejandra) completed her fall term to take an hour of her time and learn about her. We'll get updates from her for our newsletters from term to term.

Ale grew up in New Mexico. She graduated from Albuquerque

eluctantly having to shelve our wonderful plans for the 40th $oldsymbol{\Gamma}$ reunion in June 2020 because of the pandemic, the Class of 1979, under President Adam Samuels, surged ahead and flourished! Despite challenges related to Covid-19, we had great success bringing classmates

together to engage in a wide range of topics — some focused on larger issues in our communities and society, some on classmates, and some on fun.

Rooks, Maurice Simmons, Margo Squire, and Reuben Stokes - opened an important conversation surrounding race and racism in America. Our goal was to create a "safe space" where classmates could come together to listen/think deeply and with compassion about these issues and speak with authenticity and empathy. From these concerns was born the Class of 1979 Conversations on Race. Each program/conversation took on a specific aspect of racism/race in America, with the goal of learning and growing in our collective understanding of the issues.



We held six Zoom programs covering: Meeting the Moment; Voices of Dartmouth Women of Color; Dartmouth Black Undergraduate Voices; the Dartmouth Way - Moving Forward, Getting Stuff Done; Public Safety and Policing Reform; and Getting Comfortable TALKING about Race. Over 350 classmates attended these events.

We also introduced a second new '79 Online series: "Sitting on the '79 Fence with ...," conceived and led by **Ben Riley**. In April, **Peggy Epstein Tanner** interviewed Dr. **Bill Holmes** about his 30+ years of inspirational surgical and public health work in refugee camps, war zones, and disaster recovery areas around the world. In June, Beth Blatt presented a dramatic reading of her play, In Her Words, about war-torn, persecuted, and impoverished woman immigrating to the United States. 10 members of the Class of 79 played the character roles in the play. About 70 classmates attended the Bill Holmes session, and 30 attended the play reading. Both programs were recorded and posted on line, with more than 115 views since the events.





he Class of 1979 has 152 Hal Ripley members, class-mates who have made a gift to the Dartmouth College Fund every year since graduation. Providing some context, the five classes from 1977-82 together only have 273 members We 79s have a legacy of support for undergraduates which is truly unique.

Last year we began to celebrate Hal Ripley members by having a random drawing of members who participate in the DCF before graduation in June. This helps our DCF agents focus on reminding non-Rippers of the opportunity to support undergraduates on financial aid by the June 30 fiscal year end.

Last year Bill Fleming was the winner of the first Hoodie drawing. Bill passed along a commemorative photo of him with his daughter Liz (above). Bill continues to work as General Counsel of ESRI in California.

We are also pleased to announce that **Doug Rice** has won the first Hoodie drawing of the 2022 fiscal year. Doug's contribution helped the 79s win another Dartmouth Scholar. Thanks to all the Hal Ripley members who made a contribution by Dartmouth's Giving Day and helped with the Dartmouth Scholar win. &

readable digest format. Our Class Secretary, Janie Simms Hamner, kept us informed and entertained with six Dartmouth Alumni Magazine columns. Janie continued former Secretary **Stan Weil**'s practice of sending classmates personalized birthday email greetings, from which she often collects material for her columns.

Mini Reunion Chairs Phil Odence and Carl Briscoe were extremely active during this pandemic year, organizing or facilitating 22 separate events with as much as 60% of the class participating in one. In addition to the Conversations of Race and Sitting on the '79 Fence sessions detailed above, we offered an art/visual studies major gathering, a discussion on the Constitution with Prof. Russ Muirhead and **Peter Robinson** '79, and a virtual tour, sponsored by Otho Kerr, of the Black History in Montgomery, Alabama. Phil and Carl also organized multiple online gatherings, including a Dartmouth 1979 trivia game with 17 attendees, six regional 79th day Zooms with more than 60 attendees, a "no-city" call with 11 attendees, and 79th-Day micro-reunions, gathering over 72 selfies. We also hosted a hike in the DC area with eight attendees, and a ski day in Park City with 25.

Our ever-active DCF fundraising team, led by Laurie Laidlaw Deacon and Bill Mitchell, inspired 571 classmates (60%) to contribute \$738,510 in support of students attending the College, earning a Dartmouth Scholar. For the 17th consecutive year the Class of 1979 received the Ray-

mond J. Rasenberger '49 Award for the Most Contributors. Our contributor total was 120 more than the second

place class of 2010 — the class with the most '79 legacies. The Class also earned the inaugural Peggy Epstein Tanner '79 Award for the highest retention of contributors following a reunion (96.5%), besting the previous record of 85%. At Peggy's request, the DCF team agreed to change this award's name going forward to the Class of 1979 Award. We also had 202 classmates make Restricted/ Friends gifts to Dartmouth of \$3 million.

Ben Riley prepared detailed obituaries for three deceased classmates, with a history of their Dartmouth years and careers, plus testimonials, photos and other remembrances by classmates, friends and family. We post these obituaries on the "In Memory" section of our website, and Ben pens shorter versions for the DAM website and the Class Newsletter. Finally, we purchase a book for Baker Library to commemorate each fallen classmate.

Under the leadership of Nancy Malmquist and George Stone, we added two new Bartlett Tower Members, bringing us to 42 (4%). Treasurer **Ellen Gomprecht Oppenheim** collected class dues from 487 classmates (50.7%). As part of that process, 75% of dues payers (367 classmates)

also contributed \$39 each to Dartmouth Partners for Community Service (DPCS),

totaling \$16,000, and then the class treasury donated another \$4,000 for a total of \$20,000 — the most in our DPCS history. Ten classmates served as remote DPCS alumni mentors and three classmates served on the DPCS Alumni Advisory Board (including President **lim Wasz** & Treasurer Bill Mitchell). CFSI director Leah Casey writes: "The Class of '79 has been a leader class within DPCS. In a tumultuous year when the DPCS internship program had to be nimble, shift to virtual formats, and remain responsive to the needs both of student interns and under resourced communities, the Class of '79 has been a rock in helping to discern the best pathway forward and providing stellar mentorship. The financial, mentoring, and strategic leadership of the class has been a vital foundation for the program's success."

Bill Mitchell provided double duty this year. In addition to his final year as DCF Co-Head Class Agent, he took over the reins from Adam as Class Webmeister, ably serving all the class officers in their many tasks and outreach to the class with over 50 class emails.

This year, we adopted **Tracy Dustin-Eichler**, Director of Dartmouth's Center for Social Impact. as a classmate.

Finally, this past year we lost our dear classmates Jack Peterson, Frank Minerva, and Pat Quinn.

Tom and Nancy have spent many years acquiring and studying art, with a specific focus on photography. The have made donations from their extensive collection to the Baltimore Museum of Art, The Middlebury College Museum of Art, the New Britain Museum of American Art, and the Hood Museum at Dartmouth. Between these museums, Tom and Nancy's donations have enabled some very interesting academic and cultural partnerships.

Tom and Nancy's collection focuses on three relevant contemporary themes: 1) Human impact on the environment, 2) Portraiture of marginalized populations, and 3) the impact of consumerism on society. These themes are represented in their photography donations to the Hood, with the hope that students will be inspired by these works and hence pursue less traditional paths in their lives.

Tom and Nancy are extremely humble about their donation, and I would never have known any of this had I not serendipitously run into him. When I asked him the genesis of his decision to name the art fund for our class, he was very succinct: "let me say that I deeply respect, and admire, the extraordinary, steadfast dedication that so many of my classmates have demonstrated year after year since we graduated. The grassroots nature of the loyalty and the magnitude of the philanthropy of some of my very close friends has been astounding and truly transformational. By naming this modest fund after the class, we're acknowledging all that they've done and hopefully identifying an acute need at the museum, and more importantly, within the Dartmouth communi-

ty, that has existed for many decades." Tom also stated that his hope is for Dartmouth to be the pre-eminent academic center for Native American contemporary art; he hopes his gift will help achieve that objective.

I think of Tom's story as one example of how we each can honor the gift we received from September 1975- June 1979. As we mature and enter this next chapter of our lives, let's continue to work together to make an impact on the College.


