

fall, including providing emergency assistance to more than 30,000 Afghan refugees. It has supported Ukraine since 2014, and has delivered 150 tons and \$22mm of protective aid to Ukrainian soldiers and civilian volunteers since Russia's invasion.

Dave's company, First Rate, contributes substantial money and resources for charitable work, including coordinating three trips a year to build Homes of Hope in Mexico, Costa Rica and the Dominican Republic.






### As a Parent, This is My Wish Aspeech by Mark Winkler '79 P'08

Dartmouth's Baccalaureate, held the day before graduation, is a multi-faith service of thanksgiving and celebration for completion of undergraduate careers. When my daughter Emily graduated in 2008, I was fortunate to be able to give the **Reflections from a Parent** at the Baccalaureate in Rollins Chapel. From June 7, 2008, here are my words:

rom the earliest times, trees have been the symbolic focus of many cultures. The roots lie deep within the ground drawing up nutrients thus symbolizing the ongoing legacy. The canopy above contains the leaves, drawing in energy and holding the seeds and fruit, symbolizing the future promise. And the trunk stands above ground providing material strength bridging the legacy and the promise. This weekend, as parents and graduates gather, we, too, are bridging legacy and promise.



The characteristics of trees lend easily to symbolism. Trees fight to keep a foothold in extreme conditions. Many trees appear to die each winter, only to sprout new growth in spring, a symbol of rebirth. And trees bear seeds or fruits, which

contain the essence of the tree, a potent symbol of immortality.

In Genesis, God planted two trees at the center of the Garden of Eden: the Tree of Life, whose fruit gives everlasting life, and the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil.

Trees, also, figure prominently in culture of Ancient Greece. Zeus, the king of gods, was crowned with a wreath of oak leaves. Columns in Greek and Roman architecture were patterned on tree trunks, as seen in the tree-like tapering, and the flutes as stylized tree bark.

Virgil, in *The Aeneid*, writes of the sacred groves within the city of Rome. The Celts of Britain and Gaul worshipped within tree groves believing trees to be sources of sacred wisdom. And the view down the nave of the Gothic cathedral of Chartres, with its columns, arches and vaulted ceilings, may deliberately resemble the path into the ancient sacred oak grove that stood on the original site.

And there is the "Lone Pine," a tree that has become the enduring symbol of our own Dartmouth College.

A generation ago, I, too, was getting ready to graduate from Dartmouth. During senior week, I remember my classmates gathering at the senior fence on the green. We talked long under the late gathering twilight as we watched the full moon rising over Dartmouth Row. I remember the sharing of our regrets: of opportunities not taken, of things not done, of

lessons not learned while at Dartmouth. Regrets like: I should have learned to write better. I wish I had climbed Mount Moosilauke. I should have spent more time in the Hop.

Since graduating, however, I have gained both experience and perspective. I have also kept in touch with my classmates and heard their stories. The physics major classmate whose writing was weak, later obtained a Master's degree in writing. The scholar classmate who had not hiked, is now leading youth groups on backpacking trips. The athlete classmate who did not have time for the Hop, is now writing musicals that are being performed around the country.

I realized that many of Dartmouth's lessons reveal themselves only well after graduation and they often provide a bountiful harvest. This is another reason why tomorrow is called, not "Termination Day," but "Commencement Day."

The retail value of your four-year Dartmouth education, in gold, would be equivalent to about seven one-kilogram ingots. So, in the end, what do you get for spending this time and this treasure?

> Did you buy title to a thriving orchard from which you can now pick fruit whenever you want? No.

> > Did you buy a service for baskets of fruits to be delivered regularly to your door? Again, No.

No, all that you have purchased is but a small bag of seeds, seeds that you have knowingly—and unknowingly—collected every moment during your four-year experience here at Dartmouth College, seeds collected from every encounter that you have had since arriving here on this tree-lined campus.

We plant our trees to benefit the next generations. So for you who are about to graduate, as a parent, this is my hope: May the endeavors that you undertake all help to transform your promise into your own legacy.

May the seeds that you have collected here at Dartmouth all find fertile ground and generous moisture and ample sunshine to grow, to grow so that the generations who follow you will benefit from the shade and the wood and the fruit.

As a parent, this is my wish.


