issues arising from astronomy and marine biology! (Not only were Doug and Rich friends at Dartmouth, they went to high school together!)

Our planet's environment is in trouble — in part because people have lost sight of where we actually came from, how we affect our environment, and how we fit into it. Doug, a Professor Emeritus of Physics, Astronomy, and Entrepreneurial Studies at Carthage College, created the Mountains of Stars program that uses astronomy to create "Environmental Awareness from a Cosmic Perspective." www.mountainsofstars.org. Through his work, Doug seeks to build a new perspective and motivate people to act more responsibly towards the world around us.

Rich is Head of the Department of Ocean Engineering and Marine Sciences at Florida Tech. His current work in Antarctica is about invasive king crabs migrating up from the deep sea

to the shallows, and his paleontological research in Panama focuses on a climate-driven shutdown in reef growth that lasted for 2500 years. Rich's work on climate change in marine ecosystems, from the Arctic to the Equator to the

Antarctic, digs into issues of planetary degradation and resilience. https://www.fit.edu/faculty-profiles/a/aronson-richard/

Led by Doug and Rich, we'll explore how we connect with the cosmos and terrestrial life around us, and how the natural world informs us about our place in the "big picture."



n order for families of color to be able to participate equitably in the American economy, access to capital – from bank accounts to loans to private equity – needs to be more inclusive. Access to capital is necessary for the creation of wealth, and wealth begets more wealth. The Federal Reserve recently reported that median wealth among White families in the U.S. is \$285,000. By contrast, median wealth among Black families is only \$44,900 – 15% of the typical White family. While the wealth of Black families has actually recently grown faster than that of White families, the wealth gap is in fact widening as a result of the sizable and persistent differences in historical and transferred wealth.

In its effort to create a more equitable America, the Class of 1979 Committee on Race is hosting a conversation at 8pm on February 7, 2024 on the importance of making capital more accessible and inclusive for communities of color -- and strategies for doing so. The goal is to give classmates a

sense of how they can effect change to make capital more inclusive, whether it's through their own investments or as individuals who have control over institutional and investment capital. Classmates leading this conversation include:

DATMOUTH EARNS SHARE OF IVY TITLE WITH CONVINCING 38-13 VICTORY OVER BROWN

Dartmouth (6-4, 5-2 Ivy) had to wait a good 20 minutes to find out its final fate, however, needing a Yale victory over Harvard to finish tied atop the Ancient Eight standings with those

two teams. The Big Green erupted with elation on Richard Gouse Field at Brown Stadium when the Bulldogs got a fourth-down stop in the final minute to secure a

In the wake of the tragic bicycle accident that left Dartmouth's legendary coach **Buddy Teevens** fighting for his life in March before succumbing in September shortly after the season began, as well as the passing of teammate Josh Balara in March after a lengthy battle with cancer, Sammy McCorkle, the Robert L. Blackman Head Football Coach, deftly guided the Big Green through it all to become the 10th coach in conference history to win a title in his first year at the helm and first since 2015.

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227^{III} SESSİON OF THE AUMNİ @UNCL

The 227th Session of the Alumni Council was held in Hanover from October 26 – 28. Here is my recap:

- Our new President, Sian Beilock, spoke to three (of five) areas of focus: health and well-being, brave spaces, and "Dartmouth for Life" (interactions between generations). Lots of excitement and support of President Beilock at Alumni Council. She is much more dynamic a speaker than was President Hanlon.
- Alumni Council voted to nominate Maia Josebachvili '05 to the Dartmouth Board of Trustees. After the vote she answered questions from the audience. Key takeaway is her entrepreneurial/ venture capital background.
- The Admissions update focused on how Dartmouth is adjusting to the recent Supreme Court case on college admissions.

 Admissions Office will still strive for diversity but not be able to know the candidate's race till after they've offered admission.
- Dean of the Faculty Elizabeth Smith described UGAR the Undergraduate Advising and Research program. Many opportunities for students 675 used UGAR last year. Also seemed like a plug for more alumni funding (currently 47% of their \$1.4M budget)
- Rassias Award (honoring faculty member who over the last five years has contributed their time and expertise to alumni related events and programs) presented to Matthew Delmont. Professor Delmont presented an interesting description of his research process behind his "Half American" book on African Americans in World War II.
- Numerous Alumni Awards presented notably a Young Alumni Award to Elizabeth Mitchell '10. Bill, Bray and Bill's mother were all in attendance.
- Comments from audience with strong support for re-instating Officers weekend.
- Questions about Dartmouth expanding the number of students met were non-committal – "we'll be studying this...".
