How Dartmouth Keeps Its Cool

ike nearly every other school in America, Dartmouth College is struggling with the breakdown of civil discourse and free expression. Students tend to self-censor or shout down views they don't like.

"I don't want safe spaces, I want brave spaces," says Dartmouth President Sian Beilock in a phone interview. At the start of the winter term in January, the Ha-nover, N.H., college launched the Dartmouth Dialogues

Ms. Beilock says the proprogram. gram aims to convince students and professors that being challenged is crucial to education. "The idea is to be around the brightest minds and to be pushed and to be a little uncomfortable," she says. "Even if you're not going to change your mind, the ability to hone your arguments and to think differently from different perspectives, these are skills

and tools of higher education." The Dartmouth Dialogues program will begin in the classroom. Faculty are already being trained on how to guide debate—particularly when a topic is likely to become charged. Ms. Beilock's hope is that students will

learn to disagree respectfully and take that skill with them when they leave the class-room. Starting in the fall, new students will be given similar training. These types of training sessions sometimes elicit eye-rolls from students, but consistently reminding students that disagreement is OK, Ms. Beilock believes that the college can "create the environment to get this

The program will also

discussions on touchy topics. These will be modeled on the school's Middle East Dialogues, begun in the wake of the Oct. 7 attacks on Israel and the start of the war in Gaza. Passions were running hot and the college sought to redirect some of that energy into a productive enterprise. Professors from the Jewish studies and Middle Eastern studies departments convened a series of public conversations about the history and politics of the Israel-Palestinian conflict. The goal was to remind students that the college's purpose was academic, not emotional. This successful initial conversation series, attended in person by hundreds of students and streamed on YouTube more than 35,000 times, was pro-filed on "60 Minutes."

Ms. Beilock knows these events won't always be popular. "It's OK if not everyone likes everything we're doing," she says. "Having a diversity

bring speakers to campus for of viewpoints is hugely important." This will be put to the test in coming weeks. On April 3, the college is set to host a moderated discussion between Samieh El-Abd, a former Palestinian Authority official, and Gilead Sher, who served as chief of staff to former Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak.

At a recent panel, a student opened by reminding the crowd that the Dartmouth community has "a responsibility to hold these conversations" and to "expect and encourage respectful disagree ment." Passions still run hot, and a single incident could set the campus against itself. But Dartmouth so far has avoided the negative attention showered on some of its League peers. Beilock's commitment to civil dialogue and free speech deserves credit.





2023 Classmate Obituaries - In Memory

Paul Albrecht '79

aul Albrecht died on July 2023. He battled Parkinson's for 12 years before succumbing to Covid. Paul and his family were longtime residents of Bedford, Massachusetts, and recently moved down the coast to Plymouth. He was 66. Born on September 17, 1956, Paul attended Wootton High School in Rockville, Maryland. At Dartmouth Paul majored in physics and served as chief engineer and then technical director at WDCR and WFRD. Paul earned M.S. degrees in electrical engineering and computer science from MIT and then his Ph.D. in medical engineering from a joint Harvard-MIT program. Paul excelled at medical technology: He was awarded 52 patents, won three ebook and mobile reading product awards, wrote open-source graphics software used for more than 20 years, and developed a core component of an early electronic medical records system now used in hospitals worldwide. Paul also founded a

company that produced a cardiac stress test system to identify risk of sudden cardiac death and developed an array of other

healthcare products, including a mobile reader app for the blind and wearable computing technology for ambulatory cardiac monitoring. Paul is survived by his wife, Sheila; son Michael and wife Christine; and daughters Megan and Melanie. Family and classmates remember Paul as "a genuinely kind and wonderful person who

wanted nothing other than what was good for his family" and as "incredibly smart and thoughtful and a gifted teacher with a quick sense of humor that made everyone laugh."

obert Blake Foster died on December 23, 2022, from cancer. Bob was born on June 6, 1957, and grew up in Cheshire, Connecticut. At Dartmouth he majored in English, although he said he studied "napping at Baker!" Bob was active in intramural soccer, tennis, and other sports and loved swimming and sunning on the Connecticut River. For many years Bob lived in Redondo Beach, California, working as an advertising executive in the automotive field. He found fulfillment as a referee for both youth and high school soccer and lacrosse across Southern California and officiated his last game in October 2022, less than two months before he passed. Bob is survived by son Blake and daughter Nicole, who fondly cherished his sense of humor and loyalty; mother Nancy; and brothers Tom '77 and Kent and their

families. Blake wrote: "My father lived life his own way and was stubborn as hell. He loved my sister and me so much, and it seemed like all he wanted to hear and talk about was how our lives were going. For him, and for me, please tell



your loved ones that you love them." Bob was celebrated by his classmates as being spontaneous and friendly, often providing the glue to pull a group together through an email chain or a visit. Classmates will remember Bob as a true and loyal friend with a huge, welcoming smile.

ellen Grinnell Haak passed away on January 13, 2023 after living 10 years with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. Kellen was born on March 18, 1957, and grew up in Simsbury, Connecticut. At Dartmouth he majored in anthropology, joined Phi Tau, and was active with crew, the Dartmouth Players, and DOC. After college Kellen worked during the summers as the chef at Moosilauke Ravine Lodge while studying anthropology and museum studies at NYU. After earning his M.A., he worked as the collections manager in the Smithsonian Natural History Museum Department of Anthropology. From 1988 to 2009 Kellen served as collections manager at Dartmouth's Hood Museum, responsible for the care and documentation of and access to art and artifacts. He loved working on the repatriation of Native American artifacts and cherished a 30-hour memorial potlatch in Angoon, Alaska, and three weeks in

Papua New Guinea. Kellen loved meeting and working with artists and enjoyed nature, good food, and military history. A
